SHAMAN (MUDANG)


The role of the mudang is to act as intermediary between the spirits or gods and humanity in order to solve hitches in the development of life, through the practice of "gut" rituals.

THE CALLING (SHIN-BYONG)

The possession from a god that a chosen shaman candidate manifests symptoms of physical pain and psychosis which may only be cured through acceptance of and full communion (Narim gut) with the spirit.

With the help of a Korean Nurse and Master Shaman, her resistance to "the calling" changes to acceptance (her birthmother's shaman root) as her paranormal power leads to the clues of the atrocities, which proves her innocence and ultimately brings justice to the ghosts of the victims.





WRITER STATEMENT

"The Calling" takes a unique approach, combining issues of cultural identity, alienation and mysticism with horror and suspense.

For many years, I've been fascinated with the intensity and the beauty of the Korean shaman ritual, which offers healing and consolation for the living and the dead.

It possesses not only inherent dramatic elements but also a unique physical expression that involves dancing barefoot on a pair of machete blades as proof of connection to the spiritual world.

This fantastic occult phenomenon inspired me to craft a supernatural thriller laden with horror elements.

A Korean adoptee, an aspiring surgeon, is trapped into an illegal organ harvest scheme which could jeopardize her life-time dream of becoming a surgeon. She then experiences her diseased birthmother's shaman calling, and sees the haunted spirits of the victims

A no-nonsense head nurse of the hospital surgical unit. A Korean immigrant who notices Claire's symptoms of the shaman calling and helps her lead to Master Shaman. A proud Korean who bravely stands up for the unjust.




DR. THOMAS ADAMS, 62

*This is only a concept book for illustrating the filmmaker's ideas and no cast is yet attached to the project.


MASTER SHAMAN, 67

Lee continued her independent filmmaking career and received numerous awards and fellowships, including Rockefeller Foundation Asian Artist Fellowship, Sundance Screenwriters Lab, Producers Guild of America Diversity Project Fellowship, Shanghai International Film Festival Co-FPC Showcase, Film Independent' Project Involve, and was in development with HBO Pictures as Writer/Director of a feature project "Koreatown Blues."
